Carlos Affonso Pereira de Souza is the vice-coordinator of the Center for Technology & Society (CTS) at the Getulio Vargas Foundation's (FGV) Law School in Rio de Janeiro. He holds a Doctoral and a Master degree in Civil Law at the University of the State of Rio de Janeiro (UERJ, 2009 and 2003) and a J.D at the Catholic University of Rio de Janeiro (PUC-Rio, 2000). Terry Fisher received his undergraduate degree (in American Studies) from Amherst College and his graduate degrees (J.D. and Ph.D. in the History of American Civilization) from Harvard University. Between 1982 and 1984, he served as a law clerk to Judge Harry T. Edwards of the United States Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit and then to Justice Thurgood Marshall of the United States Supreme Court. Since 1984, he has taught at Harvard Law School, where he is currently the WilmerHale Professor of Intellectual Property Law and the Director of the [Berkman Center for Internet and Society](#). His academic honors include a Danforth Postbaccalaureate Fellowship (1978-1982) and a Postdoctoral Fellowship at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences in Stanford, California (1992-1993).

Dr. Corinne Michaela Flick is attorney of law and Founder and CEO of the Convoco Foundation, an Anglo-German Think Tank which enables an interdisciplinary exchange of ideas regarding questions of social relevance. She studied both law and literature at Ludwig-Maximilians University, Munich, taking American studies as her subsidiary. After her exams she worked for Bertelsmann Buch AG and Amazon.com. Dr. Flick is Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Aspen Institute Germany, Co-Founder of the Friends of the Bavarian State Library, Munich, and a member of the Executive Committee of the International Council of the Tate Gallery, London.

Floriana Fossato is Associate Director for International Development at the Center for New Media and Society at the New Economic School in Moscow. Ang Peng Hwa (Ph.D., Michigan State University; MA University of Southern California; LL.B., National University of Singapore) is Professor and Director of the Singapore Internet Research Centre at the Wee Kim Wee School of Communication and Information at Nanyang Technological University. He researches social impact and law and policy issues around new media and the Internet. He is the author of *Ordering Chaos: Regulating the Internet* (2005), which argues that the Internet is being, will be and should be regulated. In 2004, he was appointed by the U.N. Secretary General to the Working Group on Internet Governance. He later co-founded the Global Internet Governance Academic Network, and served as its inaugural Chair.

Ingolf Pernice is the director of the Walter Hallenstein-Institute for European Constitutional Law. He studied in Marburg, Geneva, Freiburg and at the College of Europe in Bruges. After his legal clerkship at the Higher Regional Court in Munich and his doctorate on European Fundamental Rights, he became an official of the European Commission in Brussels in 1980, first on the topic of competition and later on legal service. In 1987 he did his state doctorate about “equity and hardship clause in public law” in Bayreuth. In 1993 he joined the Johann Wolfgang Goethe-Universität Frankfurt. Since 1996 he has been a professor of public law, public international law

Since 2006 he has been leading the DFG – Graduate School „Verfassung jenseits des Staates“ (Constitution Beyond the State) and from 2006 to 2008 he was the dean of his faculty. After his visit as a senior research fellow and guest lecturer at the Law And Public Affairs (LAPA)-Programme in Princeton in 2008/09, he expanded his research from European commercial law, environmental law, currency law and constitutional law to issues of global constitutionalism, for which he deems the Internet to be an essential factor.

Mayte Peters is the Manager of the Network of Centers, based at the Alexander von Humboldt Institute for Internet & Society in Berlin.
